Pupil Premium Funding 2013-14

Pupil Premium Grant (PPG) was introduced in 2011 to schools. The pupil premium grant gives schools extra funding to raise the attainment of disadvantaged pupils from reception to year 11. From April 2012, pupil premium funding was also extended to include all children eligible for free school meals at any point in the past 6 years, looked after children and service children.

The grant allocated may be spent by schools for the purposes of the school; that is to say the education benefit of pupils registered at the at school or for the benefit of pupils registered at other maintained schools; and on community facilities, for example services whose provision furthers any charitable purpose for the benefit of pupils at the school or their families or people who live or work in the locality in which the school is situated.

Fullbrook has a proven track record of securing achievement for those students in receipt of pupil premium funding. In 2013-14, there were 233 students in receipt of pupil premium funding.

39 students qualified for pupil premium in 2014. 35 of these students received extra guidance and support through intervention strategies. 4 students could not take advantage of these programmes (2 of these students were at hospital school and 2 had passed the threshold of permanent exclusion). The data below shows the gap is closing and steps are being taken to ensure students studying mathematics and who qualify for pupil premium are being monitored and included in the subject's intervention strategy for 2014/2015.

Pupil Premium 2014-15

In 2014-15 pupil premium funding will rise to £935 per student and will continue to be allocated for every student registered for free school meals either currently or at any time in the past six years and to any looked after child. We expect the pupil premium grant to be approximately £235,985 and it will be used to enhance these students' outcomes.
