Pupil Premium Funding 2014-15

Pupil Premium Grant (PPG) was introduced in 2011 to schools. The pupil premium grant gives schools extra funding to raise the attainment of disadvantaged pupils from reception to year 11. From April 2012, pupil premium funding was also extended to include all children eligible for free school meals at any point in the past 6 years, looked after children and service children.

The grant allocated may be spent by schools for the purposes of the school; that is to say the education benefit of pupils registered at the at school or for the benefit of pupils registered at other maintained schools; and on community facilities, for example services whose provision furthers any charitable purpose for the benefit of pupils at the school or their families or people who live or work in the locality in which the school is situated.

Fullbrook has a proven track record of securing achievement for those students in receipt of pupil premium funding. In 2014-15, there were 244 students in receipt of pupil premium funding.

The pupil premium grant allocation for the academic year 2014-2015 was £240,622. We recognise that there are many students who have benefitted from the activities that have taken place not just those who qualify.

Fullbrook's Key Priority:

To narrow the disadvantage gap by addressing inequalities and raising the attainment of those pupils who qualify for pupil premium funding. As a school we intend to use the funding to

- Improve levels of attainment and progress by improved attendance
- Close attainment gaps relative to expected levels of progress
- Access a broad and balanced curriculum relative to the student's needs and the school's curriculum.
- Access our extra-curricular provision
- Access alternative curriculum as appropriate

Typically 50% of our PP students are also eligible for SEND support and 1:1 catch up so for purposes of efficiency and effectiveness provision has been amalgamanted.

Impact of Pupil Premium Provision

Note. The current invalidated Raise on Line and DFE performance table do not include 72 upgrades following remarks of GCSE papers (27 of which were English)which positively affect outcomes for students in receipt of pupil premium.

Of the 51 students on roll in receipt of funding only 44 attended. As a result of exceptional circumstance 7 were on roll but did not attend as they accessed other provision for medical and other reasons.

Pupil Premium 2015-16

In 2015-16 pupil premium funding rates per student will continue as in 2014-15. We expect the pupil premium grant to be approximately £225,415 and it will be used to enhance PP students' outcomes through:

- Focus on PP students who join at KS4 and those who do not attend for medical or other complex reason
