Assigning the grade

-TAGs will be decided based on a holistic and objective judgment of the evidence of student performance across the basket of evidence

-The grading process is not intended to be a formulaic calculation (JCQ)

-Any access arrangements will be in place for May Assessments

-If any patterns/findings emerge from the May Assessments which demonstrate the cohort have been disadvantaged with a particular component of an assessment, this will be considered when making the holistic judgement

-To ensure students are not disadvantaged, we need to have the flexibility to adjust contributions/ weightings of the different components of the basket of evidence

-Teachers are not making grading decisions in isolation. Once grades have been assigned, our internal quality assurance process will ensure that standards are appropriate prior to sign-off by the Head of Centre



Additional Notes

- JCQ have asked all schools to produce a 'Centre Policy' which gives fuller details about the processes used to arrive at grades
- Fullbrook's policy will be on the website from April 30th
- Confidentiality All TAGs must remain confidential. Teachers will not disclose the submitted grades until Results Day arrives.
 Students and parents should not ask for the grades. Any undue pressure could result in a malpractice case.
- Appeals There is an Ofqual consultation document running from April 21st May 5th. You can read it on the Ofqual website, with the opportunity to respond also given to staff, students, and parents
- Current view is that appeals can be made on: I.Procedural / Administrative Error
 2.Unreasonable exercise of academic judgement

 $NB \rightarrow$ The consultation clarifies unreasonable exercise of academic judgement with the following example. It is only where the original decision represents an unreasonable application of academic judgement that a result will be incorrect. For example, a decision to award a grade B will not be unreasonable where the decision maker for the appeal considers the evidence would support either a grade A or a grade B. Both would be reasonable and therefore neither would be unreasonable.
